The need for afterschool programs was made unmistakably clear. More than 100,000 individuals contacted Congress in support of these programs, with countless others advocating at state and local levels. Bipartisan leadership at both the state and federal levels reinforced that afterschool and summer programs are essential and must be funded. As attention on our field grew, afterschool professionals rose to the moment, demonstrating an unwavering dedication to delivering high-quality experiences and opportunities for young people.



A variety of quality improvement resources for out-of-school time programs are provided by our afterschool consultant team. These resources include self-assessment and external evaluation tools in the form of our Quality Assessment and Improvement Tool (Quality Tool) and the Program Quality Assessments (PQA) through the Weikart Center.

Feedback is gathered at the end of each academic year to help our team assess their impact in the field.

OBSERVATIONS

Assessments provide program sites with data to identify strengths and areas for growth. Observations are conducted at program sites with the Weikart Center's Youth and School Age Program Quality Assessment tools.

SCHOOL-AGE CHILD CARE

Child care centers participating in the Child Care Quality System (CCQS) may earn a certified quality rating showing that they have practices in place related to positive outcomes for children. This helps child care centers enhance their subsidy funding, enhance their marketing, and open up additional funding resources. UAN's School-Age Child Care (SACC) Specialist team plays an integral role in supporting school-age classrooms at centers participating in the CCQS system by providing observations, technical assistance, and for some, intensive coaching.

OBSERVATIONS

The **School-Age PQA** measures best practices in centers serving youth 5-12 years. The tool looks at both the physical environment as well as interactions between youth and staff.

INTENSIVE COACHING AND PROFESSIONAL LEARNING COMMUNITIES

Centers participating in CCQS have an opportunity to apply for **intense targeted coaching and training** to help with their quality improvement goals. School-age classrooms at participating centers work with the SACC Specialist team in either a **one-on-one or practice-based coaching model**. Additionally, centers can enroll in a Peer Learning Community cohort and receive technical assistance in a group setting.

UAN defines School Day Alignment as the level of **coordination** and **collaboration** between school-day and out-of-school time program teams regarding the pillars of school-day alignment: **relationships**, **policy**, **shared resources**, **student needs**, **and academics**.



Monthly Cohort sessions detailed best practices and current research on each of the five pillars of School Day Alignment: relationships, policy, shared resources, student needs, and academics. Cohort participants included OST program representatives from across the state of Utah. Participants set and shared SMART goals, successes, and challenges in their work.

STEM & ENTREPRENEUR INITIATIVES

UAN continues to provide multiple STEM and entrepreneurship initiatives as part of our services for programs throughout the state. In addition to the initiatives listed below, we also provide multiple opportunities for STEM and entrepreneurship training through our professional learning team. This year, 102 staff attended related professional development opportunities, serving approximately 2,250 youth across the state.

Through the AmeriCorps Utah STEM Initiative, UAN has the exciting opportunity to place qualified STEM Specialists in schools and afterschool programs at a reduced cost to organizations. These STEM Specialists design and implement fun, handson activities like chemistry experiments, engineering challenges, and coding games for youth aged 6-17. AmeriCorps is the only federal agency for community service and volunteerism, engaging adults in public service work with a goal of helping others and meeting critical needs in the community.

Million Girls Moonshot is a initiative designed to increase diversity and equity in STEM by engaging 1 million girls across the United States in high-quality, innovative afterschool learning opportunities. UAN partners with Utah State University (USU) Extension to create more equitable and inclusive engagement for girls in STEM by implementing transformative programming.

This year, we expanded our entrepreneurship work through the Young Entrepreneur Program. In partnership with Venturelabs, Craft Lake City, the Salt Lake City Library, and the Downtown

Farmers Market, we hosted spring and summer cohorts for middle and high school students to learn product development, marketing, sales, and entrepreneurial thinking. Each participant received a \$250 materials stipend to launch their business and sold their products at the Downtown Farmers Market and at Kid Row during the Craft Lake City festival.

POLICY/ADVOCACY



REGIONAL NETWORK WINS

To build a statewide culture of high-quality afterschool programming and strong advocacy, UAN convenes Regional Networks in Northern, Southwest, and Southeast Utah, as well as Salt Lake County. These networks align local efforts around advocacy, training, resource sharing, and other shared needs. This year, the Northern Utah Network, the Northern Utah Youth Alliance, secured its first legislative win with a \$500,000 appropriation to support multi-organization college and career programming.

SUPPORTING 21st CCLC

Afterschool and summer programs nationwide faced uncertainty as FY 25 funds were delayed at the federal Office of Management and Budget, and approval of FY 26 funds remained uncertain. UAN partnered with the Afterschool Alliance and the 50 State Network to launch a statewide outreach campaign advocating for the release of these funds, generating over 15 local and national news stories highlighting the potential impact on programs. National efforts led to the successful release of FY 25 funds.

DAY ON THE HILL

February 2025

On Valentine's Day, the UAN team and programs throughout the state joined together on Capitol Hill to draw attention to the needs of OST programs in Utah. We hosted activities and demonstrations for youth, performances, and meetings with legislators. We also provided opportunities to show support, including outreach materials and activities for programs.

UAN recognizes the impact of intentional and highquality data collection practices for programs. Supported by funding through Promise Partnership Utah, the Utah Afterschool Network created and facilitates a unique Utah data collection system through Salesforce for afterschool organizations throughout the state. This system stores, manages, and reports on programmatic information recorded by afterschool educators and grant administrators.

Programs throughout the state of Utah utilized Salesforce for OST Programs during Summer 2024 and School Year 2024-25 to collect programmatic data, including youth and family demographic information, program attendance, activity participation, and program incidents. Salesforce for OST Programs is a first-of-its-kind platform, dedicated to making programmatic data entry, grant reporting, recording family engagement efforts, and academic/behavioral interventions simple, affordable, and highly-impactful in helping programs tell their stories.

UAN continues to work with state agencies and funders to manage and facilitate a ongoing system of support for programmatic data needs, constantly adding or modifying processes and data collection as requested.
